


It's easy to find your way around, to take your time and connect with our nature and our people.




There are some big signposts in our region that will help guide you and introduce you to the hidden gems along the way.

THE PINNACLES



Taking the old logging trail up the stone steps and through the bush gives you a sense of the rugged nature of our mountains. Ladders and stairs lead you to the peak for a panorama from forest to coast. Mystical at sunrise and sunset.

HOT WATER BEACH






The simple magic of a handmade hot pool lapped by the waves of the mighty Pacific. Low tide is the time to visit, when the underground hot spring can be found near the surface.

The name says it, all you need is a spade.



COROMANDEL COASTAL WALKWAY



From the road end you venture across *The Coromandel's* northern most point, with views out to the barrier islands and down to the deep blue below. Taking a shuttle from Coromandel Town means you can enjoy the dramatic drive and won't need to double back.

WHENUAKURA WILDLIFE SANCTUARY






A secret cave leads to the turquoise lagoon in the submerged volcano crater, invisible from Whangamatā Beach. Your guide will show the way and tell the story of this protected island and how you can help preserve its future.



CATHEDRAL COVE



Shaped by ancient volcanic forces, a majestic cathedral arch connects two golden sand coves in a place of Māori legend and great beauty. Walk the track from the village of Hahei, take boat and kayak tours through Te Whanganui-a-Hei marine reserve.

KARANGAHAKE GORGE





Deep valleys, rocky tunnels and swing bridges take you along the rivers through relics of goldmining fever in the wild beauty of the native forest. Dramatic views down into the gorge from the Windows Walkway and a highlight on the Hauraki Rail Trail.




HAURAKI RAIL TRAIL



Connecting Kaiaua on the Shorebird Coast of the Hauraki Gulf with the deep Karangahake Gorge through the mountains, it's a leisurely flat ride across marshlands and rural plains. Charming towns along the way welcome you with old school hospitality.

SHOREBIRD COAST





The wild protected shellbanks and wetlands of the Shorebird Coast shelter thousands of migrating birds. A spectacular sight from the Pūkorokoro Miranda Shorebird Centre on the edge of the Hauraki Gulf.

Wide open nature, the beach, the bush and the swimming holes, the barbeques and the fishing trips; all the simple elements and the true luxury of time to spend with those who matter most.




OUR BEACHES

FAMILY FUN




RETAIL THERAPY


WALKING


FISHING


KAURI



Giants of the once-mighty forest tower above the canopy on the 309 Road and magnificent ancient specimens stand tall on the Kauri Block and at the Square Kauri.







Miners left behind stamper batteries in Thames and Coromandel Town, long tunnels in the Karangahake Gorge, spooky mine shafts at Puketui, relics to tell the stories of the hard years in the grip of gold fever.
